



Chamber Music Northwest: Inspiring musical experiences that bring culture and artistry to the community



Five weeks, 28 different mainstage concerts, over 100 musicians, 125 pieces of music, at many locations across the Portland area.” And that’s just this summer so far! declares Peter Bilotta, Executive Director of **Chamber Music Northwest (CMNW)**. He fell in love as an audience member before he took the reins of the organization in 2013, and is proud to champion the amazing work they do. “It is the most diverse, dynamic, varied musical program in the country,” he explains. “It is a really unusual organization, unlike anything else in the nation.” Chamber Music Northwest brings world-class music and musicians across Portland and the region, staging concerts with world-renowned musicians, providing educational opportunities for promising young professional musicians, and taking music out into the community.

What is chamber music?

Chamber music is music played by a small group in an intimate space, with one musician on each part, but beyond that, there are few boundaries defining chamber music.

Every year, Chamber Music Northwest brings in roughly 100 of the highest caliber musicians from around the world to play with other world-class musicians they may never otherwise meet, and to play music that may be outside their normal repertoire. Each group is comprised of a broadly diverse collection of musicians with varying specialties and backgrounds, ranging from young rising stars to seasoned profession-

als. Artistic Directors Gloria Chien and Soovin Kim scour the globe to build each year’s CMNW artist community, and it’s not unusual to find Grammy winners and famous names among them. CMNW has a unique residency arrangement, set up with a summer camp-like atmosphere, and resident musicians perform in a wide variety of venues and in various combinations.

CMNW hosts classical music concerts, of course, but that’s just the beginning. Their schedule this summer included Eastern Inspirations — Asian-inspired pieces — string, percussion and saxophone quartets, a piano quintet, and operatic vocals work, among other solo and ensemble pieces. And their musicians play everywhere; venues such as The Patricia Reser Center for the Arts, free community concerts in Portland-area parks, The Armory at Portland Center Stage, and several college auditoriums. CMNW even includes a unique AT-HOME series, hosting online virtual concerts available in audience living rooms. And while CMNW may be best known for its summer festival, featuring more than 100 events and activities, the organization hosts events and concerts year-round as well.

The CMNW program also features original music the organization commissions from composers. Chamber Music Northwest has commissioned work from composers at the highest level of their profession and from young hopefuls just beginning their careers. They premiere these original pieces in concerts and festivals, recording them and making them available to stream and purchase. CMNW is, in fact, one of the largest commissioners of new chamber music in the United States.

CMNW Educational and Community Programs

Chamber Music Northwest is about more than performances; CMNW is also dedicated to bringing music to the community and fostering the next generation of musical leaders. A large portion of its events and concerts are performed free in parks, community centers, educational

institutions, retirement communities, and health-care settings. They work hard to cover as much geographical ground as possible in the Northwest, ranging from Eugene up to Vancouver, WA.

CMNW records and shares Masterclasses, in which resident artists coach younger musicians, making them available to view in person or streaming online. Its educational efforts are also focused on two major programs, detailed below:

Protégé Project

The Protégé Project, currently in its 12th successful year, brings early career musicians to CMNW to cultivate their remarkable talent and provide opportunities to perform with resident musicians. This program has turned out numerous internationally renowned artists, and nearly all program alumni have gone on to professional musical careers; you can learn about past Protégé Project artists [here](#).

Young Artist Institute

This year, 2022, was the inaugural year for the Young Artist Institute (YAI), a three-week intensive program for young string musicians ages 14-17. The students selected for the program are some of the most advanced

talents from around the world, and after mentorship from the program’s esteemed faculty, they become elevated to near-professional standards. The first-year graduates came from all over the world and country, including artists hailing from Taiwan, South Korea, China, Texas, and Tennessee. YAI musicians are featured in CMNW’s Summer Festival free performances, both as soloists and in string quartets.
